CHOOSE A WASHER TYPE

Help your customer quickly identify the washer type that fits their home with questions like these.

- What style is your current washer and when was it purchased?
- What size is your laundry space?
- How many people live in your household?
- How often do you do laundry?



Top Load Agitator Washers

- Lid on the top for loading and unloading
- An agitator is the familiar spindle with fins in the center of the wash tub
- Select models offer deep fill water level options
- Often lower in price point than other options

(Agitator shown for illustration only.)



Front Load Washers

- Door in the front to access the wash tub
- Can be easier to access and move clothes from washer to dryer
- Stackable models paired with the matching dryer are great for small spaces



Top Load Impeller Washers

- Access is through a lid on the top
- Controls may be on the back panel or on the top of the washer
- Impeller fits close to the bottom of the wash tub
- Offers greater capacity than agitator models

Combination Washer/Dryer

- Functionality of a washer and a dryer in one appliance
- Usually ventless, meaning no duct to the outside is necessary for drying
- Ideal as a secondary unit in an in-law suite or upstairs near bedrooms

SELLING A WASHER

KNOW THE AVAILABLE SPACE

- What are the measurements of your current washer height, width and depth?
- What are the measurements of the space the washer fits into—height, width and depth?
- What is the width and height of any doorways, hallways or stairways that the washer will pass through for installation?

Make sure that laundry space planning includes:

- Room to follow installation instructions for chosen washer model.
- About 4 feet in front of the machines to allow for door swing and loading and unloading.
- Add at least 6" of space for water hookups and drainage.
- Top load models need a minimum of 20" clearance above the machine to fully open the lid.

MATCH THEIR LAUNDRY NEEDS

Ask: Do you want to be able to control the water level in your washer?

Show: Models with a deep wash or deep fill water level selection let customers use more water with some loads and clean others with lower water levels.

Ask: Where is your laundry space located in your home? What would be the most convenient space for your washer?

Show: Stackable front load or combination washer/dryer units can make it possible to install the washer in a more convenient location, like near bedrooms or in a hallway closet.

Ask: What are some of the challenges you have in your laundry space? Do you have enough storage?

Show: A laundry pedestal can be added to a front load washer for increased storage and easier access, without bending or stooping to load and unload.

UNDERSTAND THE FEATURES



Washer Capacity

Capacity is the size of the inside wash tub measured in cubic feet.



Add a Garment

Nearly all washers sold today have a lid/door lock for safety. Many models offer an add a garment option which allows additional items to be added.



Sanitize

Washers with a heater offer a sanitize cycle for fabrics that can handle high wash temperatures like towels and sheets.



Bulk Detergent Dispenser

Some washers offer a detergent dispensing function. Detergent can be added to the bulk dispenser and sensors measure each load and then the right amount of detergent is added for that load/cycle.
